APA PATIENT DEMOGRAPHIC

Patients enrolled by APA are more likely to be female than male (63% vs. 37%). Most are ages 30-59 years. About 70% are between 0-100% federal poverty level and 60% are Caucasian. Upon entrance into the program, 34% report being employed full or part-time; only 19% describe "no work limitations." After exiting the program, employment increases to 42% and 36% describe no work limitations. Survey data collected by the program, as well as anecdotal reports from patients, document the improved health and work capacity of patients as they are exited from the program.
