FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



Greetings,

As Anchorage Project Access (APA) celebrates its 10th year in the Anchorage community, I'd like to take this opportunity to thank all of you—the heart and soul of APA for your generosity in serving our most vulnerable. If it wasn't for you and your staff—there wouldn't be an APA.

MANY THANKS FROM THE APA BOARD OF DIRECTORS AND STAFF!

Life continues not only with the traditional Project Access program but with Medicaid expansion and the Affordable Care Act. We have out-

reached with various entities in the community and Crystal, our eligibility specialist, assists with enrollments for Medicaid and with ACA marketplace insurance at: Beans Café; the Municipality of Anchorage DHHS; Anchorage Neighborhood Health Center and St. Francis House Food Pantry. The need for access to health care continues and we are doing all we can to be at the forefront in assisting those in need.

We are proud of our enrollment vetting process that we've honed throughout these 10-years and trust we can continue to assist wherever we're needed. Please remember to send us your referrals so we can make sure patients receive the care they need. If you have a patient you think may be eligible for Medicaid or ACA insurance, send them our way and we will assist them in applying for the appropriate coverage. As always, emergent cases continue to be processed immediately. It is our steadfast resolve not to hold up an emergency due to "red tape." As I've mentioned previously, once an APA patient is enrolled in Medicaid and/or for insurance on the ACA marketplace, we will notify your office immediately so you can bill accordingly.

Another change that is happening at APA is we are launching a "pay it forward" dental project in conjunction with the Providence Emergency Department. The program is modeled after a similar project in Battle Creek, Michigan. The concept is—in a nutshell—that prior to treatment—except for emergent situations—the patient will do community service in lieu of the dental procedure he/she is in need of. We're starting small but hope to build this project into a success similar to what all of you have created with the medical portion that is Anchorage Project Access. In case you didn't know, our medical patients agree to do 20 hours of community service in lieu of the care all of you so generously donate. And—I must say—a huge number actually do so.

Thank you again for all you continue to do for our patients and please do not hesitate to contact me with any questions or concerns regarding our program.

We are proud of the progress we've documented in our 2015 Annual Report. The theme of the report is about new paths to our destination. HERE'S HOW YOU ARE HELPING

Robin knew that something wasn't right when he could no longer walk up a flight of stairs without having to stop and catch his breath. After a discussion with his primary care provider at the Anchorage Neighborhood Health Center he was referred to Project Access for cardiology. Robin was seen at the Alaska Heart Institute where he was found to require cardiac surgery which was performed by Denali Cardiac and Thoracic Surgical Group who ultimately performed the life-saving surgery.

Since his surgery, Robin has noticed significant improvements in both his health and overall ability to live his life. He no longer is fatigued by minimal activity which has allowed him to once again be employed. He has also spent time volunteering at the local Rescue Mission. Since his recovery, his mother has become involved with Project Access and donates money to the organization when she can so that other individuals in need can receive the same level of care and compassion that her son did. He is greatly thankful for all of the help from Project Access and cannot imagine what his life would be like today if he had not been able to obtain the surgery he needed.
